

# Starting Begonias from Tubers



Nothing brightens up a shady garden like Begonias. These flowering bulbs are available as finished plants in spring but can also be started early indoors.

## Why grow your own?

### SELECTION

Traditionally you'll only see the standard Non-Stop Begonia selections on greenhouse shelves. But if you choose to start your own, you'll have many other varieties to choose from - hanging

basket types, picotee types with ruffled blooms, and novelty begonia with unusual coloured blossoms.

### COST

As with starting seeds indoors, you'll save a large amount of money by starting Begonias from tubers. Though the price of one tuber may seem similar to the price of a finished 4" pot in the greenhouse, the bulbs are twice the size, meaning larger blossoms and more blossoms per plant. Plus, if you choose to overwinter your begonia tubers, every year your tubers will increase in size, meaning even bigger blossoms.

### IT'S EASY!

Begonias are easy to start indoors; all you need is a sunny window (or grow light), some 4" pots and a seeding tray. Simply fill 4" pots to the top with a well drained potting mix such as Schultz Seed Starter. Nestle the tuber into the soil so it is just at or below the soil surface. Most tubers have a hollow side; this is the side that needs to be facing up when planting the tubers.

After they are planted, they can be carefully watered in and placed in a sunny, warm window. As the tubers grow, the pots or flats can be turned every day to keep foliage compact and even. If tubers start to form flower buds, these can be taken off to divert energy back into growing leaves - there will be lots of time to bloom in summer!
